#### About the United Nations 2023 theme



International Day of People with Disability (IDPwD) is a day to understand and respect people with disability.



It happens on 3 December each year.



The United Nations is an organisation where countries come together to:

- discuss world issues
- fix world issues.



Every year the United Nations focuses on an idea that helps to remove **barriers** for people with disability.



A barrier is something that stops you from doing something you:

- need to do
- want to do.



We call this idea for IDPwD the United Nations theme.

Themes are important ideas that come up in different areas of our work and lives.



The themes for IDPwD are about making the world more **inclusive**.



When something is inclusive, everyone:

- can take part
- feels like they belong.



The 2023 United Nations theme for IDPwD is about making the world better and fairer for people with disability.



Everyone needs to work together to make this happen.



The United Nations says that the work everyone does as part of this theme should:

- involve people with disability
- be for people with disability.



The theme includes goals.



We talk more about the goals in the next section.

## The Sustainable Development Goals



The 2023 United Nations theme includes goals.

They are also called the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

There are 17 SDGs.



The 17 SDGs are things that countries want to work on by the year 2030.



The goals will help to make the world better and fairer for everyone.



It's important that people with disability:

- are part of the work that countries do
- have a say in what happens.


